



Junior Counselor Certification Course

Introduction

Becoming a junior counselor is a significant step. In the process of boyhood to manhood, or of cadet to counselor, a junior counselor is much closer to a counselor (man) than he is a cadet (boy). At least, that's the way it's supposed to be. A junior counselor is young enough to identify with the cadets he leads, but he must be enough of a grown-up that the boys respect him as well as have fun with him. Like a counselor, a junior counselor is a role model. And he is a leader.

That's why this course is based on the *Leadership Guide Trail*. To take this course, you will need a copy of the *Leadership Guide Trail* (CCC Product No. 3007). Within that Guide Trail, there are four options for adventures. We are only interested in the third option: Junior Counselor.

If you have already successfully completed the Junior Counselor adventure in the *Leadership Guide Trail*, congratulations. You qualify as having passed the Junior Counselor Certification Course. If you have not, you can pass the requirements by completing this course.

Go through this booklet with your *Leadership Guide Trail* guidebook open (this course is based on the 2019 edition). Note that each question has a page reference after it. By looking up the referenced page in the guidebook and filling in the blanks under the question, you will discover resources and help for your task. Don't underestimate the importance of helping to run a Cadet club effectively for the boys ... and for your Lord.
